2. Roll Call of Member Libraries

6. Deborah Caldwell-Stone – Director of the **Office for Intellectual Freedom**. She also serves as executive director for the **Freedom to Read Foundation**, an allied organization that participates in freedom of speech and freedom of the press **litigation**. Caldwell-Stone has worked closely with librarians, teachers, and library trustees on a wide range of **intellectual freedom issues**, including censorship of library resources, **book challenges**, internet filtering, and **meeting room policies**. **She is usually quoted in newspapers, radio, television as both an expert and advocate for intellectual freedom and censorship.**
